If you explore the Timetable of Classes, you can find some really interesting and unusual classes. Some of these classes are designated as Special Study (SS) classes. Special Study classes are normally only taught for one semester, so their topics can vary wildly semester to semester. If one of these classes sounds interesting to you, you should definitely sign up for it, as you might never have the chance to again!

HIST 2104: Issues in US History (MWF 1115-1205)

• Murder in American History. This course examines a number of notorious and lesser known murder cases, using murder as a lens to study the dynamics of society that celebrate, condone, or condemn murder. Area 3.

HIST 2984: Ancient Generalship (TR 11-1215)

 Alexander the Great, Hannibal, and Julius Caesar. This course examines how ancient sources depicted three great generals of the ancient Mediterranean.

CLA 2454: Classical Literature in Translation (MW 4-515)

• **Games and Ancient Myth**. The study of major works of Ancient Greek and Latin literature in English translation. Area 2.

RLCL 1004: Intro to Religion & Culture (TR 930-1045)

• Religion and Identity in the Age of Intelligent Machines (rotational basis). This course introduces students to problems of religion and human identity that Artificial Intelligence (AI) is generating. Area 3 and 7.

HIST 1984: Reacting to the Past (TR 930-1045 or TR 1230-145)

Learn history through role playing

games. Revisit some of the most important moments in history as an active participant. Area 2.

For out of state students, Virginia Tech has an entire database dedicated to find out which classes are

equivalent to the classes at your community college. If you happen to find a class that you are trying to substitute, but you do not see it in the out-of-state database just get the syllabus of the course from your local college and send it to the VT's Office of Registrar. There is also a form that you need to fill out that explains the process in more depth.
